

Oasis Will Raise \$2,789,000 This Year Most of It from Individuals Like You

Oasis will raise close to \$3 million dollars in Fiscal Year 2019 (July 1, 2018—June 30, 2019) from over 3,000 generous donors. Next year, we'll need to raise more to respond to the ever-increasing numbers of impoverished women and children who come through our doors—often in crisis—seeking help. Who are these charitable contributors?

Individuals - Hundreds of individuals send gifts in response to our letters, emails, and social media appeals. Some give \$5 while others offer six-figure donations. Many host outside events and donate the proceeds. Individuals are the heart of Oasis—a fact which makes Oasis a uniquely effective organization. Without each one of you, we simply would not exist.



Foundations - Foundations are organizations that exist to provide funding to other nonprofits. Eighty-one private, family, and corporate foundations support Oasis. Foundation grants are usually restricted to a specific program (in contrast with general operating funds that keep the lights on) and often don't recur from year to year. Oasis staff continually searches for new grants and renews existing ones, when possible.

Corporations - Multiple businesses, some local and some national, partner with Oasis providing volunteers, gifts-in-kind, and most important—financial support. This corporate funding is indispensable to our fundraising strategy. Oasis offers the businesses something too: an opportunity to have a positive impact on their community and on the world.

Government - The federal, state, and local governments award funding to nonprofits that benefit the community. Government grants are highly competitive and have stringent reporting measures. Oasis secured two significant government grants last year and continues to seek increased government support.

Civic and Religious Groups - Schools, churches, Rotary clubs, women's clubs, temples, all support Oasis. These groups design fundraisers and send us the proceeds. They often provide in-kind support through food, clothing, coat, and baby needs drives.

Volunteer Spotlight

Ginny Sniatkowski taught high school math for 33 years. Since 2009, she has tutored Oasis GED students, helping them prepare for the math GED exam.

How did you get involved with Oasis?

Through the Brookside Swim and Racquet Club ladies—through Ann Wagner and her daughter. I got involved in the paddle tennis fundraiser (Lobs for Love) and then started to volunteer.

What do you get out of volunteering here?

The huge appreciation I feel for the courage of the women and the circumstances they come from...I get more from them than they get from me. I get the sheer joy of knowing them, I get to appreciate their progress and the sheer determination it takes to commit to getting a GED. They amaze me. But what impresses me most tremendously is how every single one of them treats me with such gratitude. Not one has ever left without thanking me for my help.



How has Oasis changed over the years you have been here? The organization has become much more effective, and efficient, and organized. I have to sing the praises of Jen [Brady]. She's a leader, she's always open to trying new things. When I talk to other people and list the programs Oasis has, I am amazed—citizenship, bank teller, the Saturday programs. There is nothing Oasis won't do to fulfill the need—every aspect of the need—in these ladies' lives.

This place is not just a haven or a shelter from the world—it's a jumping-off point. When I first came the nest meant protection. Oasis gave security. Now the symbol means something different. It is as if the nest is giving women what they need to leave the protection, to live on their own. It is a place that gives women what they need to fly.

What do you do when you aren't tutoring? I like to play platform tennis. But, clearly the work at Oasis is more important.

Student Spotlight

A Second Chance at Education



Emoni is 18 years old and has been coming to Oasis throughout this school year. She has already passed three of the five required GED tests—science, math, and writing—and has reading and social studies left to take. Emoni smiles a lot—she smiles as she is talking—and she is very polite.

Emoni started high school at Eastside and was an excellent student—on the honor roll. She went to school every day. "I never missed," she says. "I was always in school."

But then a series of bad things happened. She was being abused. One day she told her basketball coach, because she felt she could trust her. That very day she was called to the principal's office. She didn't know why, because she was a good student and had never been called to the office.

She learned the school had called the department of children's services. "People in suits were there," and she was removed from her mother's home. She hadn't expected that.

After that she was moved from place to place, from home to home. She lived in Morristown and at the YMCA in Newark. She lived in Linden. It was hard getting used to different places, but she tried to make the best of it. In the midst of everything, her father died.

At the end of junior year, she was told she could go back to live with her mother and she was so happy she packed up and went back home to Paterson. She didn't return to Eastside then. Instead, she enrolled in a community program for youth who have left school and completed three GED exams there. After two years, the program funding was cut. She wanted to complete high school, and her counselor suggested she try Oasis.

"I have two more exams to take—these last two are my hardest subjects—reading and social studies," she says. "Sometimes I think this is not me. I am 18 and my graduation year was last year—I should have graduated—I was on the honor roll. I see other people passing, and I get discouraged."

"But still I know I am blessed. Oasis opened a door for me. There was no other program that I could step into to finish these tests. Oasis opened the door."

Emoni would like to give advice to other Oasis students, and it is this: "Do not give up. At the end of the day, your time is coming. The staff and teachers here will go the extra mile for you. Don't give up. The sky is the limit. You have got the resources here. You can do it."

We agree with Emoni. We know she can do it. We're all routing for her.




Director of Development: Laetitia Cairoli

The Gala of Hope is one of six annual Oasis events—joyful celebrations of the Oasis mission—that together raise some 36 percent of annual revenue. Last year, with Clarissa at the helm, Oasis events brought in \$1,777,344 from individual and corporate donors.

Oasis secures over \$650,000 in grants each year from corporate, private, and family foundations. Most grants are highly competitive and involve a lengthy application process. While some grants recur from year to year, most grant funding is limited to one or two consecutive years. Grant research, writing, and reporting is a constant at Oasis, managed by Hamna.
